YEAR 3 & 5 NAPLAN RESULTS 2019

Parents of students in Year 3 and Year 5 received their child's individual test results in Reading, Writing, Language Conventions and Numeracy, in a sealed envelope addressed to each family, last Friday. The National Assessment Program – Literacy and Numeracy (NAPLAN) is an assessment program for Year 3, Year 5, Year 7 and Year 9 students, testing knowledge and skills in Literacy and Numeracy. The results of the tests provide another source of information for students, parents, teachers and principals about student achievement which can be used to support teaching and learning programs. In May 2019, NAPLAN tests were administered throughout Australia. It is important to remember that teachers in all schools assess their students' learning in literacy and numeracy on a regular and ongoing basis. NAPLAN testing complements but does not replace the information that teachers gather. If parents wish to discuss their child's NAPLAN results they are invited to make an appointment with their child's classroom teacher.

Findon Primary School's Child Safety Officers

The school's child safety officers, are Paula Cosgrave (Principal) and Joanna Vellis (School Counsellor) who will promptly manage the school's response to an allegation of disclosure of child abuse, and ensure that the allegations of disclosure are taken seriously. The principal is responsible for monitoring the overall school compliance with this procedure, but in the event the principal is not available, our school counsellor will work with the assistant principal and take on the responsibility of managing the allegation or disclosure of child abuse.

All school staff have a duty of care to protect the safety, health and wellbeing of children in their care. If a staff member has concerns about the safety, health and wellbeing of children in their care they should take immediate action, and seek support and/or advice from the Child Safety Officers or assistant principal.

The school ensures that children's rights to be safe are maintained and each child is protected against physical and sexual abuse, and neglect. It is essential that any child connected to the alleged child abuse is protected until the allegation is resolved.

Broad areas of the Child Safety Officer role are to:

Provide authoritative advice:

- Act as a source of support, advice and expertise to staff on matters of child safety.
- Liaise with the school leaders to maintain the visibility of child safety at all times.
- Lead the development of the school's child safety culture, including being a child safety champion and providing coordination in communicating, implementing, monitoring, enhancing and reporting on strategies to embed a culture of child safety
- Promptly manage the school's response to an allegation or disclosure of child abuse, and ensure that the allegation or disclosure is taken seriously
- Ensure due processes and guidelines are followed when making: a report to Child Protection/Child FIRST; responding to Student Sexual Offending and Responding to Incidents, Disclosures and Suspicions of Child Abuse by ensuring the correct paperwork and templates are utilised during the response.

Raise awareness:

- Ensure the school's policies are known and used appropriately ensuring that they are part of the school's induction for staff and are available to pre-service teachers and volunteers. The policies will be uploaded to the website to ensure the community understands the schools Child Safe practices.
- Ensure the school's child safety policy is reviewed in the context of school self-evaluation undertaken as part of the school accountability framework.
- Ensure the child protection policy Mandatory Reporting Policy is available publicly and parents are aware of the fact that referrals about suspected abuse or neglect may be made and the role of the school in this.
- Be alert to the specific needs of children in need, those with special educational needs and young carers.
- We promote diversity and tolerance in our school, and people from all walks of life and cultural backgrounds are welcome. In particular we promote the cultural safety, participation and empowerment of Aboriginal children; children from culturally and/or linguistically diverse backgrounds and children with a disability and ensure all are safe and can participate equally.
- Encourage among all staff a culture of listening to children and taking account of their wishes and feelings in any measures to protect them.
- Ensure the school delivers programs to children to ensure they understand their rights around being safe and strategies to use when they are not feeling safe.

Train:

- Being authoritative in providing advice by:
 - keeping staff skills up to date with appropriate training carried out every two years
 - having a working knowledge of how the Department of Health and Human Services (DHHS) and Community Service organisations conduct a child protection case conference to be able to attend and contribute to these effectively when required to do so
- Be able to keep detailed, accurate, secure written records of concerns and referrals.
- Ensure each member of staff has access to and understands the school's child safety policy and procedures, and the Code of Conduct, especially new and part time staff.
- Make sure staff are aware of training opportunities and the latest DHHS and DET policies and guidance.

PARENTS REMAINING IN CLASSROOMS AFTER MUSIC BEGINS at 8.57am

I am respectfully requesting that **ALL** parents in F-2 leave the classroom, after dropping off their child, as soon as the morning music begins at 8.57, in order for the teacher and students to begin the daily learning, promptly at 9am. The morning process begins from 8.50am, where students are encouraged to demonstrate independence, by hanging **their own bag**, placing their **reading satchel** in the tub, and taking out their **lunchbox/ water bottle** in readiness for the day. Parents who loiter and remain in the room, hold up this process, which impacts on the whole class. Students who **arrival late**, after 9am, are expected to collect a **Late Pass** via the office. Parents are **NOT** permitted to accompany their child up to the classroom, once learning and teaching has commenced. Thank you in advance for your cooperation regarding this matter.
